Today Mary Mann, a fellow Altrusan, and Shaylan Dillon, came to present **The Samaritan Community Center's** (SCC) 8 outreach programs. The Samaritan Community Centers motto is to *Serve the hurting and hungry*. They are not a faith based but a "grace" based non-profit. Even though they serve tens of thousands of community members, they employ only 65 full and part-time staffers and they are blessed with over 360 volunteers monthly.

The programs that we were introduced to were:

1. Samaritan Market – This is the food pantry that serves over 23,000 individuals which include 21,000 children *IN OUR COMMUNITY*.

2. Samaritan Care – This outreach includes counselling, encouragers and social workers. Samaritan Care helps those in need find resources to assist them in their dire times as well as counsellors that are staffed through John Brown University's Masters intern program and overseen by licensed psychologists.

3. Samaritan Café – Where other non-profits may call this a "soup kitchen" it is the desire of SCC to project respect and understanding for those in our community that are hungry

The Café is open to the General Public and provides a free hot meal during the lunch hours. They served over 49,000 meals last year (2016).

4. Samaritan Garden – The garden allows clients of the SCC to have access to healthy food. Last year alone they harvested over 16,000 lbs. of food and are on track this year to harvest 20,000. The SCC will be hosting a fundraiser June 10 from 5pm-8pm to raise money for this specific program. NOTE: DID YOU KNOW THAT....because of community partnerships this is the FIRST fundraiser the SCC has ever had?? 5. Samaritan Dental Clinic – Although this service is only offered to uninsured adults, in 2016 alone they provided \$362,732 in dental services. They were also able to provide over 30 sets of dentures to community members in need. We heard a very sweet story about a veteran who had not had teeth for 10 years and was in tears when he was given his new chompers!

6. Samaritan Shop – If you have never been to the Samaritan Shop it is an awesome store and is now located in the old K-Mart building directly across the street from Walmart on Walnut. The Samaritan Shop is also a way you can donate ANY household item to help. The Samaritan Shop provides SCC with over 1/3 of its total operating income. The Shop also distributed \$483,955 in free clothes to the needy in 2016.

7. Samaritan Kids – This outreach is responsible for the SnackPak program and the BackPak program. The Snack Pak program supplies 196 schools in the area with snack paks and cost is around \$60,000 per month. This program helps hungry children by providing them with a weekly snack pak filled with nutritious items that

kids can have access to over the weekend. The BackPak program distributed back paks and school supplies to over 3500 children in our community.

8. Little Libraries – This is a program that encourages reading and literacy. The little libraries are placed in areas that are considered to be impoverished and allows children to select books that they can keep.
