Gay remined everyone that there will be a new budget in June when our new fiscal year begins. She checked with Vella to see if all funds budgeted for this year have been spent. Money is available for potential donations from this year's budget!

The Samaritan Community Center had no plans to prepare backpacks this year due to Covid 19, so we were



not able to provide help in the form of books for the backpacks. But we have money! So, it was decided to donate \$500 to the Samaritan Community Center for their food distribution in the form of "SnackPacks" for families. Here is our brand-new President, Kris with our Immediate Past President, Gay practicing social distancing and presenting the check to Bryan Armlovich of the Samaritan Community Center. After the check presentation Kris stayed and packed Snackpacks and sorted groceries in the Market Pantry all afternoon. Our new President has hit the road running. In June they will organize back packs instead of Snack Packs as they have packed enough to last until mid-July!

Last fall we donated 150 backpacks to the **Gravette Library**, for their summer reading program. This year Covid 19 changed things and there will be no in-Library programs. They have designed a new program featuring classic fairy tales that will include online Story Times and Summer Learning Bags. We still had money! So, we donated \$500 to help with this program. Karen Benson the Librarian says, "Thanks to Altrusa, we'll have a great, even though different, summer reading program! By the way, I was notified yesterday that I've been selected to speak at the national Association of Rural and Small Libraries conference about our STEAM program. I can't wait to tell everyone about those sewing machines!" We are happy to help Karen.



**Club Dues** were due, but due to possible financial difficulties for members created by Covid 19, the deadline for payment of dues was extended to July 15. Or two payments – half by July 1 and half by November 30 - was also acceptable.

Gay completed our Club's Annual Report. We have earned enough points to be a Distinguished Club again this year!

The **District Eight Award Winners** have been posted. Our club was well represented. Peggy is our leader in this endeavor. Due to her fine work we received the following awards.

May 9 was a book sorting day. There were 50-60 boxes of books in storage that need to be sorted and "stickered". Peggy reported that the group made "some good progress" and that it was a "thrilling" experience.

They needed socks so a check was delivered so they could purchase them. They will be in our budget for next year! How this project has grown since we first met Sammy Laney. She is remarkable.

President Kris is on the Advisory Council of the Single Parent Scholarship Fund. She reported that they have been doing counseling via Zoom and have helped 37 adult students with a variety of assistance including food, rent, utility bills, child care, college books and tuition.

On the Communications front Valerie is working on the new yearbook. It was suggested at one of our meetings that the yearbook might be easier for our members if it was online rather than printed. Please think about this and we can discuss this at a future meeting, Articles have been sent to our local newspapers on the Samaritan Community Center Presentation.

Days for Girls has prepared 3000 masks which have been donated to rural hospitals, nursing homes and first responders. Lorrie is looking for guidance in finding ways to sell masks and use the proceeds for Days for Girls. It was suggested that she advertise on Facebook. Karen Robbins gave us some statistics about the Single Parent Scholarship Fund.

In 2019 total scholarship funds were \$399,250 for 48 single parents.

The average parent income is \$11,000.

52% of parents have been victims of violent crime.

The average GPA of parents is 3.5.

Impressive!! Aren't we happy to be able to support their activities!



Kris, Gay, and Terri gave our \$400 donation to the **Thomas Jefferson Elementary School** Librarians, Diane Reid and Sue Bentlel. We have been given permission to put up a "**Book Box**" outside the school!

Because of social distancing and other virus concerns our Club may have to change at least two of our major projects,

the **Spaghetti Dinner** and the **Dictionary Presentations.** Janet has agreed to contact the schools to get their input regarding dictionaries. **Tiffany Snodgrass, Assistant Principal at Thomas Jefferson Elementary School** thinks there is value in giving each third grader a dictionary since it can be used when covering the state curriculum to "analyze a word to interpret information". She also thinks it's valuable to give students something that they can physically hold and thumb through and that belongs to them.

Connie introduced Tiffany Snodgrass, Assistant Principal at Thomas Jefferson Elementary School. Connie noted that we have two connections to Tiffany. We do several things to support Thomas Jefferson Elementary School and we support the Loads of Learning Program that she and her husband Ben, who joined the meeting later from his position as Captain with the Bentonville Fire Department, run laundromats in Rogers and Bentonville. There is a small bookshelf at the Rogers site which Connie stocks and a larger area that Tina stocks at the Bentonville laundromat. We also send playing cards and puzzles that are donated to us, to the Bentonville site.

Tiffany appreciates all that we have done at Thomas Jefferson. Monetary contributions to the school library and Roar Store, volunteer time running the book swaps and working at the school's book fair and Roar Store and,

of course, book donations. She and the school librarian have been discussing how they and a few teacher's aids could run the monthly book swap with books we would provide since we are no longer allowed in the building. According to what she's heard, the Roar Store project, with its emphasis on earning tickets for positive behavior, was a success. The students were able to spend their tickets on items at the store. The store will need items for this coming school year.

She and her husband decided that a laundromat would be an ideal place to help members of the community. They purchased Olive Street Laundry in Rogers and then later bought Sugar Creek Laundry in Bentonville. In "normal times" once a month at Bentonville and once every two months in Rogers, they have a **Loads of Learning Night** when families can do their laundry for free and receive free meals. A professor from the U of A is there with students who do science projects or crafts with older children while other volunteers read to the young children. All children leave with at least one free book. During the current restrictions, only one person

is allowed in at a time to do laundry and pick up food and books. Ben enjoys seeing the kids light up when they're told they can take books home. Even in this time of social distancing and other restrictions, they are still distributing our books.

The **Literacy Committee** will investigate expanding the use of **Book Boxes**. They will meet to make recommendations about placing and filling them at schools and other locations in our communities. Connie thought that we may be able to get some from the Northwest Arkansas Gazette as they are taking their paper to an online venue and we have used their newspaper boxes in the past. Terri has acquired two more of their boxes for the remarkable price of \$1 each. This is the Book Barn Sheryl Burhenn had at Autumns Reride using one of those boxes.



Gail reported that we're thinking about having a book box in front of the Decatur School and the school principal in is agreeable to that.

Kris recorded a portion of this meeting and will see if it makes sense to record future meetings and then send a link to those who could not attend. She said she can also help committee chairs set up Zoom meetings.

**Altrusa District 8** is offering online training on a variety of subjects. Training is on the evening of the second Sunday of every month and should not last much longer than 30 minutes. Contact Kris for details and to get a link to the training.
