There were two guests, Christina Bush, a friend of Kris' who is a prospective member and Penny Storms who is the District Eight Governor Elect. She will be installed as District Governor in Tulsa next April. She said she is *"at your service"* for questions regarding District matters.

Connie shared what the **Literacy Committee** has been up to. We are still looking for sources of children's books and she has planned for the DEB Project and the Samaritan Center to share their excess books. She and Gail will look over our existing supply and sort them for presentation to Decatur and Thomas Jefferson elementary schools and the Gravette and Bella Vista libraries.

The book boxes at **Gravette/Decatur Schools and Libraries** have been completed and installed. Go to our Facebook page to see pictures of the boxes as well as those at **Thomas Jefferson Elementary.** And see the work that went into them by Gail and her husband Butch, and Terri and her husband Bill.

Our **Days for Girls** liaison, Lorrie Healy, has sent a shipment of kits to Lebanon and Venezuela. If you would like to volunteer in your own home doing sewing or non-sewing tasks, she is happy to prepare a tub of materials for you to work with. Just call her at 801-699-8669 and you can pick up and drop off the tub on her porch, or ask she will deliver it to you.

Tina reported that the **DEB Project** is doing well and is expanding. The Project now has 3 former shops that have been merged. The third, which holds home décor, was added recently. We met Sammy years ago when she was starting this mission and was working out of her home. Sammy works with counselors and social workers to find families in need. Each season foster-home kids get 5 free tops and bottoms. And! We have a book nook there! Great job Sammy.

The **Dictionary Committee**, led by Janet, met, and will provide dictionaries to 3rd graders in Gravette, Apple Glen, and Willowbrook, and to 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders at Decatur. That amounts to about 520 books; last year we delivered 1900. Terri is going to check out a sample of the Spanish/English dictionary sold by The Dictionary Project with the possibility of providing some to Decatur and maybe to Gentry.

Connie reported on the **Support Our Soldiers Committee.** They are developing a project for a group workshop for "kits" which members may complete at home and then return. The project, cutting out stars from salvaged flags and using them to create pocket cards that will be given to veterans on Veterans Day. Also, to be included in the **Socks and Cookies Christmas Project**. We received 266 bags of jerky from the DEB Project, for the Socks and Cookies Christmas Project!





Sept 8. Was **World Literacy Day!** Our members went parading around our world giving away books to Thomas Jefferson Elementary, Bella Vista Library, Gravette Library, Decatur Library

and Decatur Elementary School. Literacy is the single most important skill to improve the quality of life! Our Club remembers know, "Today's readers are tomorrow's Leaders!"

The Decatur Librarian had requested books for adults and The Literacy Committee received a donation of hard cover adult books that were given to them in honor of World Literacy Day. Gail informed us that at a parade stop, Gravette Library staff member Bailey, gave her a copy of the *West Side Eagle Observer*, the local newspaper, that had an article about our Club. Bailey also gave her a *Thank You* card for the \$500 donation for non-fiction books that we gave the library.

KUDOs to Marion! She learned about the need for child-sized masks when she was part of the World Literacy Day parade. She went right home, made 60, and gave them to Decatur! If you know of any other place that need children's masks, Marion said to "Let her know!"

Tina let us know that Sammy has described the re-set at the **DEB Project** store a success. Sammy praised Connie for picking up and dropping off items. And praised Judy who was there every day and was an amazing help. The pantry is going to be replaced with grocery gift cards. As for the Dictionary Project, Kris reported for Janet. English dictionaries

were ordered for Gravette, Apple Glen, Willowbrook and Decatur. There were two boxes of Spanish/English dictionaries ordered for Decatur and Gravette. A big THANK YOU to Linda for storing the books in her garage.

The **Single Parent Scholarship Fund** has been dealing with problems brought on by this Covid 19 mess. Karen said the office is still closed. All contact with students is either virtual or electronic. There will not be a Christmas Party this year, but **The Festival of Giving** will still take place. However, donors will be asked to purchase gift cards instead of items, for the student's *wish list*. They are organizing special days for recipients to drive-through and pick up needed items each month to help them through this difficult time via a September Supply Drive. Requested supplies are: 12-pack toilet paper, 6-pack paper towels and feminine hygiene products.

Connie informed us that the Literacy Committee is in the process of gathering books and Beanie Babies for the Single Parent Scholarship Fund Festival of Giving.

Our program today was presented by Dr. Amanda Musick, **the Director of Student Services for Bentonville Schools.** She explained the **Bright Futures Initiative.** The Bright Futures Initiative has been in existence for six years, providing, within 24 hours, the personal needs of students and their families. She thinks the initiative has improved graduation rates since, there are student advocates at the high school level who work with potential dropouts and encourage students to attend classes more regularly. Supplies are available for teachers, counselors, and principals to provide, in a hurry, items such as clothing and food. Needs such as rent and utility payments are also provided but may take longer. When COVID-19 caused schools to close they provided 85,000 meals in three months! School bus drivers delivered food to the homes of the 100 students who were not able to travel and get the meals. She suggested that, related to literacy, we could donate funds for schools to use at their book sales events.

Our club treasurers are doing a fantastic job of caring for our cash!

Our Club **Foundation Treasurer**, Vella Lewis, reported that the Sept. account balance was \$19,016.85. Our Club **Operating Treasurer**, Karen McAuley, reported that the Sept. account balance was \$3,807.05. The Petty Cash balance was \$74.63. Both reports will be filed for audit.

Terri described the book boxes at **Thomas Jefferson Elementary School** as unfortunately placed. The school librarian said that our book boxes are not being used even though she is promoting it with her library classes. She is going to find a better location for them. The librarian will set up a book swap in October. Terri has provided Fall and Christmas themed books.

The **Dictionary Project** has been completed for this year. Linda reported for Janet that the dictionaries have been delivered! She and Karen M. delivered dictionaries to Gravette and Decatur. At Decatur, the principal gave them a tour of the school, and the two-3rd grade and the two-4th grade classes that received the dictionaries. Third graders received dictionaries at Gravette. Terri delivered the dictionaries for third graders at Apple Glen and Janet took the dictionaries to third graders at Willowbrook.

The virtual Altrusa Benediction was given by Carla.

On **Oct. 10th** the **Support Our Soldiers** committee met at Judy's home and re-named the project. It is now, **Stars for Hero's.** Karen and Connie had been remarkably busy getting the items for the **Stars for Hero's** to be assembled. Six of us made up 250 **Stars for Hero's** pocket favors and had a wonderful time visiting while we cut, stapled, stuffed, and labeled.





Connie ordered baggies, holiday paper, and card stock from Amazon. The card stock was not strong enough to hold the

staples so Connie asked Staples if they would donate stronger card stock. They agreed to donate the stock and cut it to our specifications as well! Go Connie!

We needed 350 **Stars for Hero's**. 50 for the State Veterans Hospital, 75 for VA Home residents and 225 for **Socks and Cookies**. So on Sat. Oct. 24, **Make A** I am part of our "American Flag" that has flown over a home or business in the USA. I can no longer fly. The sun and winds have caused me to become tattered and torn. Connie let us know that former member Su Lynn Hanson, is coordinating a joint effort with the DAR and our Club to collect and distribute books as part of **National Service Day**.

Gail told us of a request from the principal at **Northside Elementary School** in Decatur for input on the **One District, One Book Program.** We decided not to endorse this as members thought it would be a hardship for the schools, at this Covid-19 time, to get the same book to all students, in all grades, to be read by them or to them, at the same time. Social distancing would make it almost impossible.

Our program today was given by Lorri Healey the **Arkansas Statewide Chapter Director of Days for Girls**. She is also our Liaison and a member of the Rogers Altrusa Club. She thanked us for our support by providing sergers, sewing machines, thread, ribbon, panties, fabric, light weight irons, and our *time* and *effort*. During the 1980's she was a traveling nurse and observed first-hand how a lack of knowledge about menstruation, conception, and feminine hygiene created severe problems in countries around the world. Still today, girls and women in some cultures are forced to experience isolation during their menstrual periods. The lack of education often leads them to a high-risk pregnancy. Days for Girls International will provide the two millionth kit in December of this year.

With proper care, the kits will last 3 to 5 years. When the kits are presented, the girls and women attend a class where they learn how to take care of the kits, the basics of self-defense, what menstruation is, and how conception occurs. They learn that menstruation isn't a disease or curse but a gift that allows women to become mothers. Financial donations are always appreciated. If you want to donate, make the check out to Days for Girls International and in the subject line write DFG Rogers AR Chapter. That will ensure that Lorrie receives the donation. At the end of the presentation, Lorrie received a virtual \$500 donation from the Club. Vella will give a real check to Judy who will take it to Lorrie. Lorrie was very thankful and explained that the funds would be used to provide heavy flow kits to a maternity hospital in Venezuela.
