Our **Mar. 16,** Zoom meeting was called to order by Vice President Connie with a reminder of the **CALL TO CONFERENCE!** Our 65th Annual Altrusa District Eight Conference will be held virtually on Sat., April 24<sup>th.</sup> This would have been the Saturday of our physical conference. Hopefully, we can attend in person in 2022.

**Governor's Book Challenge!** In lieu of a Conference Service Project this year, the District Eight Board approved a book give away challenge. This is a challenge to all clubs to donate books in their own communities between now and April 17th. Clubs report donations to Governor Penny Daugherty along with a picture to be posted to the District Eight Facebook page. The clubs donating the most books to their community during that time will have their project shared on the Altrusa International Service Facebook page and win a \$150 registration fee paid by the District for the next Conference.

We had a guest! It was Gillian Allen, a native of Scotland, a past president of the Altrusa Club in Dallas and a friend of Connie and our Facebook page. She now lives in Thibodaux, Louisiana and is working to form a club there. She is the one who made the Altrusa face masks!

Tina has been keeping an eye on the **DEB Project.** She said the store is getting ready for the summer reset and needs people to help hang clothing and the pantry could use wet wipes and diapers. Activity on the on-line site has been a little slow. Sammy is working on getting another therapy dog to be given to Washington Junior High School. The pantry needs donations of peanut butter and jelly (not in glass containers please), diapers, children's hair accessories, and gift cards for Walmart and Harps.

Judy reported on **Days for Girls.** Our Liaison Lorrie Healy let her know that there are always items that must be washed (to shrink) before they can be used for the kits. If members would like to do some laundry, please let Lorrie know. 801-699-8669. She'll have the material ready for you. Looking for an Altrusa get together? Let Judy know! You can have it at Lorrie's. There's room for social distancing. Connie and her quilting group donated several bolts of material! We had three paperback books written in Spanish which we gave to Days for Girls and were sent to Venezuela. So, now we can say we donate books internationally! Karen R reported that she received a donation of 25-30 spools of polyester thread (black and white) and will give them to Days for Girls.

Our program today was presented by Teresa Hudson, Program Director of **Ignite Professional Studies of Bentonville Schools.** She spoke to us about this career preparation program. High School juniors and seniors attend their regular classes at Bentonville High School, Bentonville West, and in the virtual school for half a day and spend the other half day in Ignite classes. Parental support is critical so there is a plan to educate them about the program also.

There are 8 strands in the Program -- Construction Management, Culinary Arts, Digital Design and Photography, Education Innovation, Global Business, Health Sciences, Technology, and Video Production. Each one has morning and afternoon classes with 20 students in a class.

To get into the program, students must complete an application and interview with a panel made up of teachers, students already in the Program and professionals. Items such as GPA, past attendance, and minority status are considered.

Through a collaboration with Northwest Arkansas Community College, students may get college credits and certifications. For example, Health Science students can earn a CNA certification. The Program has a waiver from the state permitting instructors not to be certified teachers. Instead, they are individuals who are or have been working in the specific strand in which they teach.

Students work on community service projects such as the DEB Project and Days for Girls. Funds are raised to help pay for college and certification fees.

The Program has been in existence for six years. The original classes were for technology students and were held in the Tata Building. As the number of strands and students grew, classes were held in other businesses throughout Bentonville. In 2019 the Ignite Center for Advanced Professional Studies was opened. It houses 6 of the 8 strands. There is also a Construction and Design Center on Wildcat Way. The Culinary Arts career strand meets at Brightwater, a Center for the Study of Food. Large grants from the Walmart Foundation have helped the Program grow. Our Club is invited to tour the Center and have one of our meetings there!

We received a donation of books from Kimberly Burgess who is a teacher in the Ignite Program. She teaches In the Education Innovation strand of Ignite and is excited about the possibility of having her students do volunteer work with us. Maybe at the Spaghetti Dinner and on book sorting days.

Carla's granddaughter has been accepted in the Ignite Professional Studies Program!

On the communications front, Valerie reported that the latest newsletter was sent out. She sent articles to the Vista and the Democratic Gazette about the Single Parent Scholarship Fund donation and on the donation we received from the DAR.

Our guest Gillian gave the virtual Altrusa Benediction.

On Mar.25 we were able to send each child in our two project schools' home with a book for spring break! Gail, on the far right delivered books to Decatur Elementary and Terri delivered books to Thomas Jefferson Elementary.


